### What are Policy Briefs?

STREAM Policy Briefs (PBs) are an attempt to share beneficial lessons that are learnt from local practice or from research. They are short and feature policy issues.

They are designed to be read quickly, to highlight key issues and to lead the way to further information sources on a topic. They are to enable people, institutions and policy makers to use new tools and mechanisms which support aquatic resources management in ways that benefit the livelihoods of people who are poor.

## Who develops and produces them?
